to go wrong in one's own way is better than to go right in someone else's rodion raskolnikov is a deeply troubled impoverished student living in the bowels of saint petersburg he is in immediate need of money and in his desperation he hatches an ugly plan to murder a wealthy pawnbroker and steal her money convincing himself that he will use it to elevate himself in society and accomplish great deeds but once the terrible deed is done raskolnikov is immediately stricken with guilt and self loathing and struggles to reconcile his sense of moral superiority with his warring conscience and all the while a noose is slowly being slipped around his neck as the shrewd detective porfiry petrovich is closing on him

through the story of the brilliant but conflicted young raskolnikov and the murder he commits fyodor dostoyevsky explores the theme of redemption through suffering crime and punishment put dostoyevsky at the forefront of russian writers when it appeared in 1866 and is now one of the most famous and influential novels in world literature the poverty stricken raskolnikov a talented student devises a theory about extraordinary men being above the law since in their brilliance they think new thoughts and so contribute to society he then sets out to prove his theory by murdering a vile cynical old pawnbroker and her sister the act brings raskolnikov into contact with his own buried conscience and with two characters the deeply religious sonia who has endured great suffering and porfiry the intelligent and discerning official who is charged with investigating the murder both of whom compel raskolnikov to feel the split in his nature dostoyevsky provides readers with a suspenseful penetrating psychological analysis that goes beyond the crime which in the course of the novel demands drastic punishment to reveal something about the human condition the more we intellectualize the more imprisoned we become dostoyevsky gives me more than any scientist more than gauss albert einstein dostoyevsky wrote of the unconscious as if it were conscious that is in reality the reason why his characters seem pathological while they are only visualized more clearly than any other figures in imaginative literature he was in the rank in which we set dante shakespeare and goethe edwin muir the greatest crime novel of all time thomas mann crime and punishment remains the best of all murder stories a century and a third after its publication we have to read it though it is harrowing because like shakespeare it alters our consciousness harold bloom

crime and punishment concentrates on the mental tumult and moral confusion of rodion raskolnikov an impecunious former student in st petersburg who contrives to murder a morally bankrupt pawnbroker in order to steal her money convinced by a friend who argues that using the pawnbroker s money for benevolent reasons would counterbalance the killing rodion commits the crime but is tormented by contradictory thoughts and the ever present danger of being caught this text is a classic work of russian

crime and punishment is a novel by the russian author fyodor dostoyevsky sometimes spelled dostoevsky it was first published in the literary journal the russian messenger in twelve monthly installments during 1866 it was later published in a single volume this is the second of dostoyevsky s full length novels following his return from ten years of exile in siberia crime and punishment is the first great novel of his mature period of writing crime and punishment focuses on the mental anguish and moral dilemmas of rodion raskolnikov an impoverished ex student in st petersburg who formulates and executes a plan to kill an unscrupulous pawnbroker for her cash raskolnikov argues that with the pawnbroker s money he can perform good deeds to counterbalance the crime while ridding the world of a worthless vermin he also commits this murder to test his own hypothesis that some people are naturally capable of such things and even have the right to do them several times throughout the novel raskolnikov justifies his actions by connecting himself mentally with napoleon bonaparte believing that murder is permissible in pursuit of a higher purpose constance clara garnett 1861 1946 was an english translator of nineteenth century russian literature garnett was one of the first english translators of leo tolstoy fyodor dostoyevsky and anton chekhov and introduced them on a wide basis to the english speaking public constance garnett translated 71 volumes of russian literary works her translations received high acclaim from authors such as joseph conrad and d h lawrence and are still being reprinted today

this edition of beccaria s on crimes and punishments and other writings presents an interpretation of his thought drawing on italian scholarship richard bellamy shows how beccaria wove together the various political languages of the enlightenment into a novel synthesis and argues that his political philosophy often regarded as no more than a precursor of bentham s combines republican contractarian romantic and liberal as well as utilitarian themes the result is a complex theory of punishment that

derives from a sophisticated analysis of the role of the state and the nature of human motivation in commercial society the translation used in this edition is based on the fifth italian edition and provides english speaking readers with beccaria s own order of his text for the first time a number of pieces from his writings on political economy and the history of civilisation which were not previously available in english are also included
